Notified Bodies

EURIS has been contacted by a Notified Body to ask for our support in securing an official confirmation from BEIS that UK Notified Bodies can continue their work until the end of the transition period (December 2020), therefore giving manufacturers extra time to consider their options. Notified Bodies have had verbal confirmation from BEIS on this but are looking for written confirmation. Given the benefit to EURIS members in securing this confirmation, we will be using our political contacts to help secure this. Political News

- Last week the House of Commons Exiting the EU Select Committee published their 5th report on the progress of the UK's negotiations on EU withdrawal. The Committee concluded that there is a great deal of continuing uncertainty about the Government's plans for providing Parliament with its meaningful vote, the type of analysis that will be provided to aid scrutiny and the length of time that Parliament will have to consider the deal. The Committee are undertaking a separate piece of work on the process of Parliament's consideration of the Withdrawal Agreement and the Political Declaration which will be published in due course. https://publications.parliament.uk/pa/cm201719/cmselect/cmexeu/1060/106002.htm
- The Department for International Trade has published a booklet highlighting a snapshot of UK trade UK Trade in Numbers. It reveals that the UK is the third most popular country for Foreign Direct Investment, with the nearest EU competitor, Ireland, at number six. New figures show the majority of UK trade is with countries outside of the EU, totaling £650.2bn in 2017, (51.1%) and the US remains our single largest trading partner as our largest export market for goods and services (nearly £100bn in 2016).

- The Chancellor gave a speech at the CBI annual dinner in which he outlined he had listened to the CBI's four customs tests, that the Government share the CBI's aspirations to minimise frictions and burdens but that staying in the Customs Union is not necessary to do this. - Also last week, a senior unnamed EU official accused Britain of "chasing the fantasy" of escaping the consequences of Brexit, as it ruled out UK plans to prevent a hard border in Ireland and build a new security relationship with the bloc.
